Clarification about Safety Data Sheets (SDS) for Non-Hazardous Materials

This technical memo explains the reasoning why Rosler Metal Finishing no longer generates and publishes Safety Data Sheets (SDS) for non-hazardous materials, such as ceramic media, plastic media, steel media, corn cob, and other non-hazardous chemicals which are used in mass finishing and shot blasting processes. The SDS were formally known as MSDS

Background

The Occupational Safety & Health Administration (OSHA) of the United States Department of Labor is the authority that regulates what information must be published by manufacturers to protect employees from workplace hazards. New global regulations, the Globally Harmonized System of Classification and Labeling of Chemicals (GHS), were adapted by OSHA and have been mandatory for all manufacturers, suppliers, distributors, and users of chemicals since June 1, 2015. Safety Data Sheets

Rosler Metal Fishing USA, L.L.C. has taken all necessary steps to comply with these global regulations. This included revising and updating all of our Safety Data Sheets (SDS) to the new format. Since the regulations only require SDS for hazardous chemicals, Rosler will no longer publish SDS for non-hazardous materials.

**Frequently Asked Questions:
Hazard Communication (HAZCOM)**

Is a material safety data sheet (MSDS) required for a non-hazardous chemical?

MSDSs that represent non-hazardous chemicals are not covered by the HCS. Paragraph 29 CFR 1910.1200(g)(8) of the standard requires that "the employer shall maintain in the workplace copies of the required MSDSs for each hazardous chemical, and shall ensure that they are readily accessible during each work shift to employees when they are in their workarea(s)." OSHA does not require nor encourage employers to maintain MSDSs for non-hazardous chemicals. Consequently, an employer is free to discard MSDSs for non-hazardous chemicals.
